Post Athens:

Financial:

The support of SPARC and the NZ Academy of Sport has again provided much needed financial certainty to our operations, our athletes and coaches. The commitment of SPARC's funding toward Beijing and specifically toward 'campaign' funding for Beijing 2008 allows our planning and preparation to gain and maintain momentum over the next two years.

The Lion Foundation has been a long term 'friend' of PNZ and we are indebted to them for their ongoing financial support.

Simon Grant:

The sudden death of Simon Grant has shocked and saddened us all and we extend our sympathies to Simon's family, friends and loved ones. It is appropriate that we acknowledge one of our up and coming athletes, someone who was experiencing the trip of a lifetime and achieving a personal ambition of representing NZ, at the IPC World Shooting Champs and that we remind ourselves to continue to be the best we can be just as Simon was doing with his Shooting career - may he rest in peace.

Chief Executive Report

This report captures the key activities and financial information pertaining to the Paralympics New Zealand (PNZ) 2005 / 06 year ending 30th June 06.

A highlight of the period under review was the moving of the Paralympics New Zealand National office from temporary accommodation generously provided by Fletcher Building Ltd to a new permanent location in Greenlane, Auckland. This was formally celebrated by an official opening ceremony with the Honourable Trevor Mallard, Minister of Sport and Recreation as the major guest. It is hoped that the new offices will become a destination for everyone involved in disability sport and individuals will be proud to visit and view the memorabilia on display and use the resources available.

A number of athletes and teams travelled in a variety of sports through the period under review and these are reported further on in this document. The major event of the year was the Torino 2006 Winter Paralympic Games. On behalf of PNZ, I thank Gerald Davies, Chef de Mission and Jane Stevens who coached the team. These two committed volunteers put in many hours of work to ensure that athletes Adam Hall and Ant Field were able to fully focus on their competition at Torino.

Results from the Torino Games did fall below expectations however both Adam Hall and Ant Field are young athletes with a great deal of potential for Vancouver 2010. The quality of competition at this event again demonstrates the rapidly rising level of performance within elite Paralympic Sport.

Congratulations to Paralympics New Zealand board member and head skiing classifier Gillian Hall who was chosen as an alpine skiing classifier for the Torino Paralympic Games.

With Torino now behind us, focus has switched to planning for the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games. To date we are well on track both operationally and we are extremely pleased with the appointment of Duane Kale as the Chef de Mission to lead the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games team. Duane has a long and distinguished background as a competitor, team manager and PNZ board member and will be a fantastic leader for our New Zealand Paralympic Team.

Grant Sharman's appointment to the role of Beijing Performance Director focusing on supporting and developing true Beijing Medal contenders and their coaches is also very positive in ensuring PNZ has done all it can to have athletes in the best possible position to deliver medals in Beijing.

In a major step forward, PNZ has entered into agreements with Athletics New Zealand, Bike NZ, Boccia New Zealand, New Zealand Shooting Federation and Wheelchair Rugby New Zealand where PNZ invests in these organisations to deliver high performance programmes for elite disabled athletes. PNZ supports this initiative with funding, sports science and medicine support plus the engagement of the Beijing Performance Director. I thank the CEO's and High Performance personnel in each of these organisations for their support and particularly to those at Athletics, Bike and Shooting for understanding that disabled athletes are members of their organisations first and foremost.

As mentioned by Simon Peterson in his Chair report, the very tragic death of Simon Grant while competing at the International Paralympic Committee Shooting Championships devastated everyone associated with the team, the New Zealand Shooting Federation and Paralympics New Zealand. Our deepest sympathies are with Simon's family, friends and loved ones.

This year also saw the passing of Neroli Fairhall MBE, a great Olympian, Paralympian, Sportswoman and role model. Again we offer our condolences to Neroli's family and those closest to her.



Paralympics New Zealand Board

The Board held 6 face to face meetings and 4 teleconferences during the period under review.

At the 2005 AGM, Ms. Michele Cox resigned from the Board. We thank Michele very much for her very valuable input and wish her well with her very busy business and personal schedule.

Also at the 2005 AGM Ms. Sandra Blewett and Mr. Simon Peterson were re-elected to the Board. Mr. Peterson was reappointed as Chair by the new Board.

I wish to thank Simon Peterson and the Board for their time, effort and excellent governance of the Organisation and support to myself and the PNZ staff and office over the past 12 months.

PNZ Staff and Contracted Service Providers

The staff numbers at PNZ have grown in the 2005-06 year with two new positions established. The establishment of these positions was considered vital to deliver on the objectives of the PNZ Strategic Plan. Wade Chang has taken the role of Operations Officer and Grant Sharman has been contracted to a part time role as Beijing Performance Director. Grant will work directly with those athletes and their coaches who have been identified as strong medal candidates for Beijing 2008 to ensure they have everything they need to deliver at Beijing.

Val Hall, Administration Manager celebrated six years of keeping the PNZ office running efficiently and effectively in the period under review. I thank Val for her ongoing commitment to PNZ.

Helen Murphy, Manager High Performance has now been with PNZ for 4 years and continues to drive the high performance programme to ensure our athletes and coaches are provided the best possible support and advice.

Fiona Allan joined PNZ as Operations Manager in June 2006 replacing Vaughan Cruickshank. Fiona came to PNZ from the Halberg Trust and has significant experience in disability sport from both New Zealand and Australia. In the short time Fiona has been with PNZ she has already added great value.

As identified, Wade Chang is the new Operations Officer of PNZ. As an AUT Practicum Student Wade was heavily involved in the establishment of the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games preparation plan throughout 2005, his work on this plan and also his systems improvement focus made him the ideal candidate to fill the Operations Officer role.

In addition to our full time staff, PNZ could not function without a team of dedicated contracted service providers. I thank them all for their great work;

Rebecca Foulsham stood down from the position of Classification Coordinator in June 2006 due to the arrival of baby number two and was replaced by former PNZ Sports Services Manager Kerry Jenkinson. We are very fortunate to have been able to replace such an effective administrator as Rebecca with someone of Kerry's ability and knowledge. Dr. Paul Wharam continues as PNZ Medical Director and Malcolm Humm of the University of Canterbury as Sports Science Coordinator. These two gentlemen are the ultimate professionals and add great value to our athletes and the organisation.

The staff members of PNZ are fully committed to continuous improvement of systems and processes and the level of support provided to Athletes, Coaches and Support Personnel associated our Organisation as we move forward to Beijing and beyond.



New Offices

On Wednesday 30 November 2005 the Honourable Trevor Mallard, Minister for Sport and Recreation, officially opened Paralympics New Zealand's new National Office at 586 Great South Road, Greenlane, Auckland.

The event was well attended by sponsors, athletes, coaches, administrators and supporters who took the opportunity to look over the new premises which include a Board/Meeting room and an Athletes/Coaches/Sports Resource room.

SPARC

Paralympics New Zealand continues to receive excellent support from SPARC and the New Zealand Academy of Sport in a very positive partner relationship.

PNZ and SPARC have a high performance investment agreement through to the end of 2008 which provides significant funding for athletes programmes and competition in the build up to Beijing. In addition PNZ has been granted money to undertake best practice international high performance programme research. Athletes and Coaches continue to benefit from Personal Enhancement Grants and Prime Minister Scholarship's.

SPARC has also committed a significant amount to support the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games campaign for which we are very grateful as we can now plan with a certain degree of certainty.

The Academy of Sport Gala Dinner held in association with the New Zealand Olympic Committee and Paralympics New Zealand was a great event again in 2005 and recognises the efforts of athletes at the elite level in all sports.

The No Exceptions strategy and implementation plan continues to develop under SPARC's stewardship. Mike Gourley the Senior Advisor Disability has worked with PNZ, the Halberg Trust and Special Olympics throughout the 2005/06 period to establish a disability sport and recreation development framework. While Paralympics New Zealand is clearly focused on elite athlete performance and the Paralympic Games, this plan requires PNZ's involvement over a two year period working with the Regional ParaFeds in the establishment of a sustainable development programme.

International Paralympic Committee

The International Paralympic Committee (IPC) held the 2005 IPC General Assembly (GA) in Beijing, China in November 2005. PNZ Chair Simon Peterson and CEO Craig Hobbs attended. This was the largest GA to date, with more than 300 participants from 90 National Paralympic Committees, five Regions, four IOSDs (International Organizations for the Disabled) and 24 Sports.

A new Governing Board was elected at the GA. PNZ was very happy with the make up of this Board and believes that it will serve the Paralympic Family very well.

Sir Philip Craven (Great Britain) was re-elected President with 103 votes out of 123 possible for a four year term. Miguel Sagarra (Spain) was elected Vice-President by a majority of 70 votes.

High Performance Report

Lion Foundation Paralympic Academy

The thrust of the Lion Foundation Paralympic Academy in 2005-6 was to orchestrate a significant improvement in the performance culture and expectation of athletes and coaches to match the performance levels now seen in elite disabled sport. The intent was to instigate a 'best practise' process that focused on medal winning performances at the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games.

The High Performance Plan objectives used to underpin the Lion Foundation Paralympic Academy are;

- **Objective 1 - Medal Winning Performances:**
Medal winning performances at Paralympic Games and IPC World Championships.
- **Objective 2 - World Class Coaches:**
World class coaches working with elite disabled athletes.
- **Objective 3 - Athlete Development Pathways:**
Implement a clear and effective athlete development pathway.
- **Objective 4 - World Class Environment:**
Create a world class environment and culture of success.

A number of new initiatives have been implemented in 2005-6 to achieve the High Performance Plan objectives

- Beijing Performance Director – The new role was established at PNZ and the appointment of Grant Sharman was made in May 2006. The role reinforces our focus on Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games and drives the performance culture. The Beijing Performance Director's brief is to work specifically with the Beijing 2008 medal potential athletes and coaches, concentrating planning and resources on the Beijing campaign.
- Sport Investment – Sports were invited to present their Beijing 2008 sport or individual programs to the High Performance Panel (HPP) in November 2005. This exercise determined the level of investment for the 2006 calendar year. Most National Sport Organisation's (NSO) presented sport programs plans while some athletes and coaches made individual campaign presentations. Based on the information presented, the HPP made investment recommendations through the PNZ CEO to the Board of PNZ.
- NSO Service Agreements – Following the sport investment presentations in November 2005 NSO's were contracted via a service agreement to deliver integrated programs for elite athletes with a disability. PNZ made significant investment into NSO's to deliver performance outcomes. It also meant that disability and sport specific knowledge could be exchanged between PNZ and the NSO. NSO's with signed service agreements from 1 January 2006 were Athletics New Zealand, Bike NZ, Boccia New Zealand, Shooting Federation and Wheelchair Rugby.
- Individual Performance Planning (IPP) – In March 2006 an extensive planning process commenced involving the Paralympic Academy athletes and coaches. Pre-existing athlete plans, performance history and international rankings were analysed by a sub committee of the HPP.

- Coach Development – This was an area that presented huge opportunity for the Paralympic Academy, its athletes and coaches. A proposal which identified significant coach development objectives was put to SPARC for coach development investment and approved in March 2006. An appointment of a Coaching Development Manager will be made in late 2006. This will enable PNZ to continue work with National Sports Organisations to improve their disability coaching programmes and to support and develop coaches currently working with elite disabled athletes.

The HPP has continued to contribute and support the work being done in high performance. The panel was reviewed in May 2006 under the current HPP Terms of Reference.

Three Paralympic Academy athletes, skiers Adam Hall and Ant Field and track athlete Tim Prendergast, recognised the value in relocating their training environment overseas and resided in America and Europe during 2005/6 to compete against international rivals in a high performance environment.

Sport Science Report

The sport science contracted partnership with the University of Canterbury continued in 2005 / 6. The sport science program has focused over the past twelve months on delivering the best opportunities to Paralympic Academy athletes in their preparation for their pinnacle events.

The provision of sport science services for athletes came through the New Zealand Academy of Sport network, under the direction of the PNZ High Performance Manager and Sport Science Coordinator. Primarily the services were provided through Canterbury University in Christchurch, NZAS Central in Wellington, Wintec in Hamilton and UniSports in Auckland. Regional athletes obtained services through local providers.

Services included Strength and Conditioning, Sport Psychology, Nutrition, Exercise Physiology and Biomechanics. Experts in their disciplines provided education programs and practical support to the coaches and athletes within their programs.

In March 2006 the IPP system was implemented. There was an IPP Team identified to drive the process and implementation. This involved taking a more holistic approach to what is going to help PNZ athletes perform to their potential. The IPP not only focused on the allocation of services but also considered aspects such as travel to & from training, coach contact hours and constraints to optimal programme compliance.

Athletes Report

At the start of this year PNZ changed their operation and focus more toward ownership of elite performance. The intention is to help make athletes more accountable for their performances. It is hoped that this will take athletes to new levels of professionalism and achievement. However, we always need to remember that the recruitment of new athletes must always be a priority. While current and short-to-medium achievement may be based around existing athletes, the whole future and achievements of Paralympics New Zealand depends on the recruitment of young athletes who must be turned into elite of the future.

Some Paralympic sports this year have had the operation of their sport run by their National Sports Organisations (NSO). This should help to improve the overall running and performance of the sport. The intention is that this merging should provide greater support and experience in the running and organisation of each sport as well as helping increase competition for all the athletes.

The NZ Academy based support has been going well again this year, with all the Academy provided services being used quite a lot, although there are still a few areas where some of the services haven't been used as effectively as possible. This has been shown where some athletes have only been using about 65% of the services they have been allocated.

Since the start of the NZ Academy of Sport Prime Minister Scholarships a few years ago, the number of athletes who have been both studying and training has increased and those Paralympic athletes who are on the scholarship programme have been taking full use and advantage of the programme and the services and support provided within the scholarship.

Overall the PEGS Grants have been very successful and used well by athletes, though there is still confusion sometimes over how the funds are allocated, what an athlete has to do to be awarded a PEGS Grant, how much they may be entitled to, and what period does the PEGS cover, e.g. 1 September to 31 August of each year.

There have also been questions about how coach funding works. Does coach funding get taken out of the athletes PEGS grant or is there funding from SPARC for a PEGS Grant for coaches and are coaches of Paralympic NZ athletes entitled to this, or do the coaches have to apply to the NSO for funding? I think

there are a few things that could perhaps be outlined a bit clearer to help athletes and their coaches, this way they will be able to budget better for training and competition. This will also help to make things easier when doing annual plans and programmes for each year and will help when planning and building up towards major competitions.

Once again this has been another quiet year as far as athlete feed back relating to coaching, management and the way they see Paralympics New Zealand operating. It is always difficult for an organisation to move forward, grow and help the athletes when there is little or no feedback. It is important for athletes to have their say as it all leads towards having more responsibility and increased professionalism. It has been disappointing to see over the last few years how the volume of feedback has declined.

For many of our sports it has been a very successful year with the Winter Paralympics, Commonwealth Games and World Championships, as well as the incredible success of Mark Ingles reaching the top of Mount Everest, something that most people would have found difficult to achieve. It just shows how much determination Mark had to achieve his dream and not let his disability stand in his way.

It is always one of the hardest things to say goodbye to our team members, friends and family. This year we have to farewell a successful New Zealand Paralympian and a member of the IPC World Championship shooting team.

Neroli Fairhall is the most well known Paralympic Archer to many New Zealanders; most known for her success in achieving Gold at the 1980 Paralympic Games in Holland, competing in the able bodied World Championships in Italy in 1981 and winning a Gold Medal at the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane as well as representing NZ at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, 1988 Paralympic Games in Seoul and most recently the 2000 Sydney Paralympics before retiring. Neroli was a much loved team mate who's success and inspiration helped many New Zealanders, both able bodied and disabled.

We also farewelled Simon Grant, a Cerebral Palsy shooter from Wellington who died tragically while competing for his country. After only competing for two years he was quickly seen at an Oceania competition earlier in the year and selected for the IPC Shooting World Championships in Switzerland, where he was hoping to qualify for the Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games

Both athletes will be hugely missed by the Paralympic family, and their memory will remain in our hearts. Their success and inspiration will live on within the sporting community.

PNZ National Championships, Christchurch, September 2005

The PNZ National Championships were extremely well organised by Parafed Canterbury in a considerably short timeframe. The event was very successful with 70 athletes and 27 staff from around NZ competing in Athletics, Shooting, Swimming and Wheelchair Basketball. Ken Sowden, Hadleigh Pierson and Ang James and the ParaFed Canterbury team are to be congratulated on running a superb event.

Beijing 2008 Planning

The preparation planning for Beijing 2008 has commenced. Four-time Paralympian gold medalist Duane Kale has been appointed as Chef De Mission for the New Zealand Paralympic team for Beijing in 2008. Duane was the Swimming Team Manager for the Sydney Paralympics and is a present PNZ Board Member.

Ken Sowden has been appointed as Operations Manager for the New Zealand Paralympic team for Beijing. Ken is General Manager at Parafed Canterbury and was Operations Manager at the Athens Paralympic Games.

Paralympics New Zealand is reviewing software options and systems that will allow for a comprehensive and leading edge means of developing all the processes and plans associated with a Paralympic Games team and High Performance planning.

Classification

PNZ continues to work towards efficient and effective Classification systems for all Paralympic sports in New Zealand. In 2005/06 PNZ has developed the classification programme, co-ordinated and supported national and international classification workshops and has allocated provisional athlete classes for IPC Sports. Where possible, this is done in partnership with the sport specific national organisation.

It must be acknowledged that most of the classification activity is done by volunteers with a determination to ensure this important aspect of Paralympic sport occurs to as high a standard as possible. PNZ would like to express its thanks all those who are involved in the delivery and development of classification in New Zealand.

This year we have had two successful "Introduction to Classification workshops" held in Wellington and Dunedin. This had the dual role of providing general information to people involved in Paralympic sports and identifying future Classifier Trainees. It is the intention to continue with two of these workshops annually.

New Year Honours

Paralymians Paul Munckhof and Colin Willis were recognised as Members of the New Zealand Order of Merit in the 2006 New Years Honours.

Paul is recognised for services to disability sport. He represented New Zealand in Boccia at the Sydney 2000 Paralympic Games and was a long term president of Boccia Association New Zealand. In recent times Paul has held the position of high performance coach with Boccia New Zealand.

Colin's award is for services to Paralympic Shooting. First selected in a New Zealand Paralympic Team in 1984, Colin went on to represent New Zealand at four additional Paralympic Games, retiring after the Athens 2004 Games.

Obituary's

Neroli Fairhall M.B.E

26 August 1944 – 11th June 2006

It is with sadness that we mark the passing of Neroli Fairhall. Neroli, who won the archery gold medal at the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane, was the first paraplegic to compete at an Olympic Games. She represented New Zealand at the Los Angeles Olympics after missing her Olympic chance four years earlier when New Zealand withdrew from the Moscow Games.

Paralymics New Zealand was very proud of Fairhall, both as a Paralympian and a sportswoman. Neroli put disabled athletes in the public spotlight. Her achievements were ground breaking and she remained very assertive on behalf of disabled people's rights.

Fairhall, who became a paraplegic after a motorbike accident in 1969 when she was 24, was selected for the 1972 Paralympic Games in Heidelberg in track and field events.

She took up archery on her return and was chosen for the 1974 Paraplegic Commonwealth Games in Dunedin, where she finished second in the novice section.

In 1980 she was chosen for both the NZ Olympic and Paraplegic teams. After NZ withdrew from the Moscow Games, she went to the Paralympics in Holland and won a gold medal and set a world record that stood for 12 years. In the 1988 Paralympics in Seoul she finished fourth.

As well as competing in archery, she coached others keen to take up the sport and was recognised for her work being made a life member of Archery New Zealand.

Simon Grant

13 October 1963 – 13th July 2006

Simon Grant started his shooting in Southland before moving up to the North Island.

He was a member of the Wellington Smallbore Rifle Association and served on their Executive. He was coordinator of the Wellington Team in the National District Championship competition and he involved himself fully in the administration of the shoot.

He was elected to the Target Shooting NZ National Executive in October 2005 and was already considered to be a very valuable member with his expertise in financial matters.

Simon was about to start his international shooting career at the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) World Championships in the 50m prone and 10m prone events. He was a member of the NZ Shooting Team and representing Paralymics NZ. He tragically died in a motor vehicle accident prior to the event on 13 July 2006.

Simon had cerebral palsy and his participation and success in these precision shooting events was a credit to his determination. He had represented the North Island team in the 50m outdoor event in February 2006 at the TSNZ Outdoor Nationals.

Simon was also known in many quarters around the world for an email quiz that he instigated called "What we do on Wednesdays". His email competitors will sadly miss the weekly quiz that he had run for the past five years.
